
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READING CORNER

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In Memoriam: Prof. B.N. Goswamy




It is difficult to write on Prof. B. N. Goswamy. In the last two decades, we collaborated to publish 12 of his books—like *The Great Mysore Bhagavata*, *Pahari Paintings*, *A Sacred Journey or Nainsukh of Guler*—all of which are enriched with Prof. Goswamy's scholarly prowess and deep insights.

My first interaction with him happened to be in the year 2005 while working on our first book, *The Word is Sacred, Sacred is the Word.* That encounter is still fresh in my mind. In the serene and peaceful atmosphere of his home, his aura seemed to fill up the entire room. With the keen eyes of a scholar, he immediately rejected the design of the book entirely as it didn't really fit the aesthetics of the subject in hand. He guided us patiently to re-design the book and when the book was finished, we were astonished to see that what would have been a piece of rock had turned into a gemstone. That is B. N. Goswamy. His clarity and rarity polished and made finer anything or anyone he came in touch with.

That was the beginning of the 18-year long journey of our collaboration. His way of expression always seemed so singular, never failing to amaze me. Once, I completed a book for him and met him at the IIC lawn on a crisp winter morning. After browsing through that first copy of the book for some time, he suddenly stood up and asked me to stand up as well. I was taken aback; a little worried to be honest. But when I stood up, he hugged me and said that merely shaking hands would not have done justice to such a wonderful job.

He always appeared self-assured, yet incredibly humble, never asking for any grand galas to be held for his book releases. When we would organise the launch of one of his books, his only instruction to me would be to send invites to all the scholars and art lovers in Delhi. Many a times, he took on this responsibility himself as well. He used to say, 'I always try to provide unknown information in a simple language'—which is true and we all have witnessed it in his regular column in The Tribune.

His knowledge of paintings, especially miniature paintings, was so vast that when he talked about them animatedly, they would etch themselves on my heart.




Such a towering personality can never be lost. He has left us when we were working on his next book—Mysore Ramayana—for which he had approved the digital copy. He was so delighted when he saw the final dummy in October last year! The book will be released very soon. He would always invite me to


lunch at his home whenever I went to Chandigarh. That day, while having a homely meal of *rotis* and vegetable curries, he said to me, 'I am always surprised by the speed and energy you work with'.

That was the last time I met him. Alas, he is not around to see the book in print. But the bond and respect we shared, nurtured over the last 18 years, will always remain. And Prof. B. N. Goswamy will keep on living amongst all of us through his works...

Today A Reader, Tomorrow A Leader!

When it comes to giving a present to someone, we have a slew of thoughts running through our heads, and we end up in confusion. So, why not go for a gift that is both inexpensive and readily available? One of the nicest gifts through which you can convey sentiment and humour in the same way that a card can, are books, but they are so much more as well! They can help the giver say things that he/she might find difficult to say otherwise.

It is often said that the human resource potential of a country is directly proportional with the reading culture in that society. When you give books as gifts, you are also contributing to the spread of that reading culture in your society. Moreover, books are eco-friendlier than any other gifts, because they are bio degradable. Since protection of environment is the prime need of the day, you can have an impact on it by gifting a book. Other benefits of books as gifts are that they do not make you fat like chocolates, wilt and wither away like consumer goods, are one-size-fits-all and are such great investments since they may last a lifetime.

Going back in history, we find that the tradition of gift-books had a long-running hold on the Victorian imagination in the nineteenth century. These lavishly decorated books, bound in silk, leather, velvet or pictorial paperboards and finished with gilt-edged leaves comprised a lucrative publishing market that spanned the 1820-40s in England. They featured poetry, prose, short fictions and engravings by well-known writers like Wordsworth, Browning, Coleridge, Walter Scott, Mary Shelley and others. While these gift books were often dismissed by many as sentimental trifles and have long been regarded by literary historians as meriting little critical attention, in recent years they have come to be viewed as significant cultural products, signaling the trend of increasing commodification of literature.

Personally speaking, some twenty years back I launched a short story collection written by a lovely Malayali lady at Kochi Book Fair. I was travelling on my own and she got hold of me through a common friend. So, she did not have to incur any expenditure on my cost

of being present at the function. Perhaps out of gratitude, she gave me a dinner and gifted me a book by Andrew O'Hagan. The title of the book was *Be Near Me*. Is not the gift eloquent enough? Well, it is another matter that I could not remain near her, but the book is still with me as a fragrant piece of memory.

On the flip side, some forty years back I was one day rummaging through the old book shops of the College Street market in Calcutta. Suddenly I chanced upon an old favourite of mine. As I thumbed over the first page, lo and behold, there was an inscription written in my hand for an ex-girlfriend of mine. Obviously, she had got rid of the book along with her affection for me! Since then, I never write an inscription on a book page. Rather I insert a card with an inscription whenever I gift a book.




The Forgotten Palaces of Calcutta
